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# <u>CSU Catalog Description and Purpose of the 1-Credit Canvas-Based Course</u>

**ESS 487: Internship** - Supervised work experience in professional settings related to Ecosystem Science and Sustainability.

**Registration:** Written Consent of the Instructor **Special Course Fee:** No

Students engaging in ESS 487: Internship in the Department of Ecosystem Science & Sustainability (ESS) are required to commit 1-credit of their internship placement in a career development-focused course primarily delivered as an online Canvas-based experience. The 1-credit Canvas-based portion of the course serves as a complement to the other ESS 487 credits and related internship placement.

## **Course Objectives**

#### In this course students will:

- Intern with an organization working in the fields of ecosystem science and/or sustainability;
- Examine, complete, and submit the various forms and documents in the ESS 487 Internship Guide, including the identification of their specific internship job functions and timeline for completion;
- Document experiential-based knowledge and skill gained through their placement;
- Evaluate their placement experience through journaling and reflection;
- Cultivate career-related skills in networking, informational interviewing, and/or job shadowing;
- Create a professional poster presentation related to their internship experience; and
- Review and evaluate their performance in coordination with their supervisor.

## **Policy on Assignment Submissions and Late Assignments**

A few assignments may be submitted on paper, but most will be submitted electronically. Pay close attention to assignment instructions and due dates in Canvas. Additionally, follow the guidelines below on assignment submissions:

- Assignments typically have a Friday due date and flexible 2-day grace period for submission.
- Beyond the grace period in all weeks except the week of final exams, each day an assignment is late, 20% of available points will be lost.
- Assignments submitted more than a week (7 days) after the original due date will not be eligible to earn points but may still be reviewed for feedback.
- The Assignment #16 due date is fixed with only the 2-day grace period.

Assignment #16 MUST be submitted to provide supervisor confirmation the student has met the required number of placement hours (at least 180 total) for the internship.

#### **Extra Credit**

There will be no extra credit opportunities in ESS 487.

#### Grading

This course is offered on a pass/fail basis-only. For Assignments and Participation, there are 1,000 points to earn, and Assignment #16 MUST be submitted to provide supervisor confirmation the student has met the required number of placement hours (at least 180 total) for the internship.

At the end of the semester, grades will be assigned based on total points earned as follows:
