Minor in Diversity and Inclusion in Natural Resources

Overview

This minor embraces human diversity and inclusion in natural resources fields through exploration of how complex aspects of diversity serve to shape natural resources and our environment in our modern era. The minor serves students who are already passionate about natural resources through an exploration of counter-narratives not often thoroughly discussed in seminal works of natural resource history.

Upon completion, students will be able to describe multiple dimensions of diversity including how individual, family, and cultural contexts have shaped past and present human-environment relationships. Students will learn conceptual and ethical frameworks to help them critically analyze how different forms of environmental governance can determine access to resources and differentially impact cultural communities. Students will gain analytical tools to engage multicultural perspectives and communicate across social and cultural differences in assessment and management of natural resources.
